

# MONTHLY OPERATIONAL REPORT AUGUST AND SEPTEMBER 2023



#### IOM IN PANAMA

For more than 15 years, one of IOM's two Administrative Centres has been operating in Panama, as well as the Office of the Special Envoy (OSE) for the Regional Response to the Venezuela Situation and the Country Office or Mission. In total, IOM has 3 offices in Panama City and one sub-office in the Darien province, near the border with Colombia.

IOM Panama has 196 staff members, 153 of which are national and 43 are international officers.

In Panama, the Mission's programmes and projects are implemented in five regions, at more than 10 sites, by 25 staff members who receive administrative and technical support from colleagues from the Panama Administrative Centre and the OSE.

### ASSISTANCE TO MIGRANTS RESIDING IN THE COUNTRY AND MEMBERS OF HOST COMMUNITIES




**112** migrants residing in the country received legal orientation and advice (migration, work and family).




# Workshops/Training sessions for migrants and members of host communities **1,432** people participated

### **OPERATIONS AND EMERGENCIES**



**164** migrants in transit in the country received medical attention at the Temporary Migration Reception Centres (ETRM) located in the provinces of Darien and Chiriqui.

# DISPLACEMENT TRACKING MATRIX (DTM)

According to the results of the July Flow Monitoring Survey conducted in the provinces of Darien and Chiriqui:

- 78% reported that their main source of information about the route were family members and friends who had previously migrated.
- 62% indicated that they did not have information about the regular ways to migrate.
- More than **60%** reported not having had enough information about the danger of the route, the insecurity they might encounter, or the difficulty of the route. Economic/financial reasons continue to be the main motivation for migration among respondents, while the second is insecurity/violence.
